John Byars
 Only the weight of circumstantial evidence places John Byars of Tar River, Granville Co., NC, as head of this provisional household. It is not known if William (Guliamе or Gulemus), George, Anderson, and James are brothers, but the proximity of their lands, interaction as witness to legal documents, and the close association of their descendants would indicate such a relationship. John Byars was in Granville Co. in the 1750s. William, who died abt. Dec. 1831, was 90-100 in the 1830 census.

N.B.

"The definition of taxable or tithable persons was first made by the General Assembly of 1715 which enacted that 'all Males not being slaves in this government shall be Tythable at the Age of Sixteen Years And All Slaves Male or Female, either Imported or born in the Country shall be Tythable at the Age of Twelve Years'"-Intro.

The date of birth for John Byars is based on possible sons, William and James, being of an age to be on the 1755 tax rolls, and his 1752 land entry.

1750, Granville Co., NC: There is a John Byarss on pg. 2 of Jonathan White's list of taxables.

1752, 30 Oct., Granville Co. NC: John Byus warrant dated same to Daniel Weldon to survey 640 acres in same county on the head of Tar River--including the planation whereon Byus lives; entered at Granville 4 Mar 1752; /s/ Fras Corbin; back of document reads: "Grant 27 November 1760." This is entry 2496 found in *The Granville District of North Carolina 1748-1763, Abstracts of Miscellaneous Land Office Records*, Vol. 4; by Margaret M. Hofmann, 1993; p. 224.

1752, 1 Nov., Granville Co. NC: John Byus plat dated same, 640 acres in Granville County on both sides of Tar River; SCC (chain carriers) William Byus, Jno Byus, Dan Weldon Survr. Entered 4 March 1752. This is entry #2497, Hoffman, p. 224.

1754, 23 Sept., Granville Co. NC: John Byas and William Byas mentioned as a chain carrier to plat of William Howlet on Michales Creek; entry 3274, *ibid*, p. 294.

1754, 8 Oct., Granville Co., NC: William Byus appears in roll of Col. Wm. Eaton's Militia.

1754, 11 Dec., Granville Co. NC: John Byus mentioned as neighbor to Thomas King, Michell Morey, Matthew McKinne. Sherd Haywood was Dep. Sur. Thomas King received 225 acres on both sides of Michell Creek in this record; entry 3104, *ibid*, p. 279

1755, Granville Co., NC: John Byus appears in tax lists as having two sons named James & William.

1757, Nov. 3, Granville Co., NC: Deed between Nathaniel Henderson and James Byars of Hanover Co., VA. Granville Co. Deed Bk. C, pp. 334-335. (This item from Marjorie Tucker to GST)

1761, 11 Nov., Granville Co. NC: John Byus mentioned as having land near Thomas Doswell who warranted 700 acres of land to Thomas Person in this record ; /s/ Dan Weldon; entry 2647, Hoffman, p. 237.

1761: Granville Co., NC: John Byars and wife Ann sold 640 a. on both sides of Tar River to Nathaniel Henderson, wit. by Wm. Sims and John Pope. This appears to be the same land as was entered on 4 Mar 1752 with a warrant to survey issued 30 Oct. 1752 to Daniel Weldon, Dist. Surveyor which was returned 10 Nov. 1752 and a grant issued 27 Nov. 1760. Skinner, pp. 141-142.

1763, 11 July, Granville Co. NC: George Byars property line is mentioned in a land purchase by Francis Foulks from H. McCullough. (*Abstracts of the Early Deeds of Granville County, North Carolina 1746-1765*; Zae Hargett Gwynn; Joseph W. Watson, Rocky Mount, NC; 1974)

1771, Granville Co. NC: John Byars and a William Byars on the tax rolls.

1785, Granville Co. NC: Mary Byars and a William Byars on the tax rolls. (*North Carolina Taxpayers, 1679-1790*, p. 31) N.B. Mary is the widow of George Byars.

Ann

Ann is listed as the wife of John Byars in a Granville County deed dated 1761.

There is a possible marriage record for this couple found in Maryland where on 3 Apr. 1743 a John Byer

was married to Ann Arnold in All Saints Parish of Dorchester County.

James Byars

This James Byars is a provisional son of John Byars. This family is presented as connected for the purpose of recording data that will prove or disprove their relationship. gst He left a will in Granville Co., NC in 1799, in which he names his wife Sarah, William Byars and William Bullock as executors. It was witnessed by Ruth Grinage, Guliemus Byars. Heirs were four daughters, all minors: Betsy Byars, Catey Byars, Nancy Glen Byars, and Lucy Bullock Byars.

1778--22 May: took loyalty oath in Granville Co. NC along with Nathan Byars. Source: The NC State Records, Vol 22, p 174, "Persons of Island Creek District." (Nathan Byars was a Rev. War patriot, b 1749 in Granville Co., NC, died 1846 in Spartanburg Co SC. Nathan had land where the National Cowpens Battle Ground is in Cherokee Co. SC. To the writer's knowledge, the descendants of Nathan have not found his parents as of 1999.)

1781--May (1st Monday), Wm. Byars apt. assessor for present year (History and Genealogies of Old Granville County, North Carolina, Owen; [Beginning of vol. 6, Minutes], p 165)

1781--Aug. 7: Jesse Harper is app'td. overseer of the Road from the Schoolhouse branch near the Mountain to Taylors Road with his own hands and the hands of Joseph Glover, Sarah Proshea Barnets Wm. Byars Jesse Barnet & Henry Williams." Ibid, pg. 205

1781--6 Nov.: William Byars to be paid 36-2 lbs. "for money which he has p'd. Rich'd. Taylor as Juror to Hillsborough Sup'r. Court. April Term 1780." Ibid, pg. 199

William is also referred to in Colonial Records of NC, Vol. 22, p 371; and COLONIAL GRANVILLE CO. AND ITS PEOPLE, by Worth S. Ray, p 301.

Apparently William Byars was a lawyer. Guillame Byars sometimes witnessed documents. One of the probate records calls this William, Capt. William Byars, indicating Revolutionary War service.

1786-87--Granville Co. North Carolina Court Minutes, p 78 in the original records: William Byars proved deed from Sherwood Harris to John Penn for 78 ac. P 82 also makes reference to suit Ragland vs. Byars for debts. This is related to Ambrose Barker's inventory of the estate of Stephen Ragland. Court Minutes of Granville County North Carolina 1746-1820; Zae H. Gwynn; Joseph W. Watson, Rocky Mount, NC, 1977; p 78.

1784-1787--State Census of North Carolina, Island Creek District:

Writer considers it a strong possibility that William Byars was married prior to his marriage in 1790 to the widow Nunn. Perhaps the older Anderson appearing in Granville Co. tax records is a son of William.

1790, July 26 - Granville Co. NC: James Vaughan was the bondsman for the marriage to Lucy Clayton Nunn; H. Potter was the witness.

(This could be the Anderson Byars who appears on Granville tax lists before and after 1800 in a sporadic way. He later married a Dortch in Mecklenburg Co. VA. He reportedly moved into Williamson Co. TN. He is called William Anderson Byars by at least one Williamson Co. researcher, but writer has never seen documentation to that fact. An Anderson Byars, believed to be this individual sold property in Mecklenburg Co. NC in 1831. Perhaps he moved west at the same time of his extended family from Granville Co.)

George Byars

This George Byars is a provisional son of John Byars. This family is presented as connected for the purpose of recording data that will prove or disprove their relationship. GST

George Byars is the earliest proven ancestor of a long line of descendants who lived in Granville Co., NC, from 1761, or earlier, until about 1835. They are possibly related to the James Henry Byars-Peggy Gentry family of Louisa County, VA, but no firm link has been established. Some of the Granville Co. Byars may

have come from Louisa County.

There is a John Byarss on pg. 2 of Jonathan White's 1750 list of taxables in Granville Co. and a John Byars on the 1771 tax lists. John Byus received a plat dated 1 Nov. 1752: 640 acres in Granville Co. on both sides of the Tar River. Sworn Chain Carriers: William Byus, John Buys, Dan Weldon, Survr. Entered 4 Mar 1752. William and John Buys continue to survey land in Granville and Rowan Counties until at least 1763. (The Granville District of North Carolina 1748-1763, *Abstracts of Miscellaneous Land Office Records*, v. 4; Weldon NC 27890, Roanoke News Co., 1993; p. 244 (records 2496, 2497).

Other *Byars* taxpayers or heads of households in Granville Co. before 1800 include William Byars, who was an attorney; Guillaume/Gulemus Byars, who witnessed several documents; James Byars who died before 1800 and left a young family; and Anderson Byars, who is found in Mecklenburg Co. VA and Granville and Warren Counties in NC. The names and ages of these men lead you to believe they could be brothers, or at least uncles and nephews. No parents are proven for any of them to this writer's knowledge. N.B. Guillaume is the French form for the name William. This form is found in Ireland during the 1200s. William Byars and Guillaume/Gulemus Byars may be the same person.

In the 1797 tax records of Granville, James Byars and Anderson Byars are counted in the Abrams Plains District, Nicholas in the Dutch District (southwestern portion), and William in the Island Creek District (the north-central area). In 1789, Mary is listed in the Dutch District with 200 acres (probably George's land). In 1800, Guillaume is in Abrams Plains, acreage is not given. He is listed as 26-45 in the census of that year, and is not found again in the census. In 1804, Anderson Byars appears again in Abrams Plains, no acreage listed. The year 1807 is the last appearance of Anderson Byars on the tax lists.

It is likely that the Anderson Byars who is over 45 in the 1820 census of Mecklenburg Co., VA, is the same Anderson Byars found on Granville tax lists. It is not likely that George Byars had a son he failed to mention in his will. He is probably George's brother or at least a cousin. This Anderson is not seen on censuses before or after 1820, to the writer's knowledge. It is possible his name is William Anderson Byars and that he appears under the name of William. Anderson Byars married Sallie Dortch in 1814 in Mecklenburg Co., VA, and is said to have moved to Maury Co. TN. A daughter, Maria L. Byers, married George Barker in Maury Co. 12 Feb 1846. Source: *The Goodspeed Histories of Maury, Williamson, Rutherford, Wilson, Bedford & Marshall Counties of Tennessee*, originally published in 1886, reprinted by Woodward & Stinson Printing Co., Columbia, TN, 1977; pg 906 (under story on William A. Barker).

William Byars, the attorney, died in late 1831, and also left a will. The 1830 census lists him as 90-100 years of age. Cyrus Davis, who married a Sallie Byars witnessed his will. This William could conceivably be the William Byars who is surveying in Granville Co. by 1752, with perhaps John being his father. Probate records refer to this William Byars as Capt. William Byars.

The descendants of George Byars who died in 1785, and William Byars who died in 1831, continue to live as neighbors after moving into Henry, Weakley and Williamson Counties in Tennessee. Judging from land deed activity, the removal of these families to Tennessee took place from 1827 to about 1835.

Country of Origin:

In light of the fact that a Nicholas Byus is mentioned in ships passenger lists of 1740 as entering Philadelphia from Germany, and the fact of the subject George Byars's family residence in the Dutch (Deutsch) District of Granville and their subsequent marriages into the known German families of Huffman (Hoofman), Glymph and Beck, the writer has considered that this family was also of German descent. However, other researchers have pointed out that German immigrants did not usually own slaves. By contrast, the Granville Co. Byars did own slaves.

Daniel Byars's preliminary research of parish records of various English counties in the 1600-1700 era, shows the use of the given name Nicholas Byars families appearing in Durham and Yorkshire. A Guielmus Byars is listed as the groom in a marriage record in Cumberland Co. in 1731, Heskett-in-the-Forest Parish. There are no Byars to speak of in the larger cities of London, Manchester, Liverpool, etc., but Daniel did find concentrations of families by the Byars surname in the northern English counties mentioned. His study shows that poor economic conditions in Yorkshire and Durham after about 1660 led many people to relocate to Ireland (Ulster) and one would presume that some of these residents may have moved to

America as well. It seems that a migration from Ulster to America began after 1717, which of course, would be another route to America for English people from the northern counties.

All things considered, the Byars family is probably English, or English with a stay in Ireland. (Letter of Daniel Byars, 1111 Greenfield Circle., Geneva, IL 60134, 18 Aug. 1998.)

1779--May 4, Granville Co., NC: Christiana Hovemany (Hoofman), aged 15 last Jany, bound to George Byards, until 18, to become "spinner." (History and Genealogies of Old Granville County, North Carolina, 1746-1800, Thomas McAdory Owen, Southern Historical Press, Greenville, SC, 1993; p 194)

1779--5 Aug., Granville Co.: George Byars is subject of land survey record # 1099: Biars, George, 280 acres, grant no. 192, Entry # 481, bk #35, pg 123; it appears that Jacob Huffman was involved with the survey which was signed by Thomas Person, Jur.

1785--Granville Co., NC: George Byars left a will which mentions his wife Mary, daughter Barbary, son Nicholas, Christina Hoofman when she marries, and George Glymph when he reaches the age of twelve. Photocopy of will in writer's file. (Granville County Record of Wills, 1772-1791, Vol. 1, pgs 426-427, document #: C.044.80002)

NOTE: Christina Hoofman married William Beck in Granville Co., NC 1788, Joseph Landers, bm; A. Henderson, wit. Writer's e-mail correspondence with John V. Beck, <jbeck@kiva.net> 906D Maxwell Terrace, Bloomington IN 47401-5166; 10 Aug 1998, states that Christina and William died in Forsythe County, NC. *Forsythe County NC Cemetery Records*, Vol. III, by Donald W. Hartmann and Ann Ellis Sheek, records the Beck-Shouse Family Cemetery, 3 miles east of Bethania on west side of C.R. 1672 (Hanes Mills Rd.) 0.65 miles south of intersection with U.S. 52: Beck, Christena C. (H: Wm.) 25 Jan 1764 - 9 Jan. 1849; Beck, William (W: C. C.) 12 Feb 1766 - 7 Feb 1845. (*Warren County, North Carolina Records, Vol. III, Abstracts of Will Books 1779-1814*, Mary Hinton Kerr, 1969; pg. 202, 216)

This Gulielmus Byars is a provisional son of John Byars. This individual is presented as connected for the purpose of recording data that will prove or disprove the relationship. [GST] Since Guilliam is a form of the given name William, it is doubtful that a family would use both names in naming their sons.

Anderson Byars appears in the tax records of Granville Co. NC off-and-on from 1797-1807.

The land had been purchased by Byars from Charles L. Jeffries. Witnessed by: Allen S. Young, Asher(?) Cox, Lewis Payne.

1837--26 Sept., Maury Co. TN: marriage records show that a Sarah Byers m. William Covey. Undoubtedly this is the Sarah Covey mentioned as age 62 in the 1850 census of Maury County. This would mean she was born 1788 and would have been 49 at the time of her marriage to William Covey. If this is, indeed, Sarah Dortch Byars Covy, then Anderson Byars has died by 1837.

Also, William Bruce Turner, *HISTORY OF MAURY COUNTY TENNESSEE*, 1955, states on p 101, under a heading of "Ashwood and Other Villages," "Rock Springs is the name given to a place where the Sowell Mill Pike crosses Duck River. A combination log school and church was built about 1830 and rebuilt in 1854. A good concrete building was erected about 1949. Baptist and other churches are in the community. Among the old settlers were Rev. W. T. Ussury, Newt Ferguson, E. T. journey, Jonas Lamar, George Cannon, A. A. Rummage, William Byers and Alex Barker."
